My child, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when He rebukes you, because the Lord chastens those He loves, and He severely punishes everyone he accepts as a child. Hebrews 12:5-6

## Levels God uses to get us out of the dirt

- I. rebukes
- 2. chastens
- 3. \_severely punishes (Greek word is flog/scourge)



Even if you are *in* Jesus, we can find ourselves in the dirt. God is the one who can lift us up and clean us off, but we have to cooperate to get fruitful.

When you were disciplined growing up, in general, did you only need a word (rebuke), or did you need consequences (chasten) or even more severe punishment to get the point? Do you see any correlations from how you were as a child and your maturing in your spiritual life with God?

Grapes don't grow on the ground. Why can't we produce fruit if we are staying in sin? Think about what sin is, and what fruit is (from last week's sermon).

Discipline does not feel loving when it is happening. How can keeping this imagery of being taken up from the dirt, washed off, and sent in a new direction help?

Read **Hebrews 12:5-12**. What do you see? How are love and discipline related? What is our role?

Many painful things in our life are <u>not</u> discipline from God. How might we tell what is God's discipline versus other causes of pain and discomfort?

What reasons do you have for staying in the dirt sometimes? How do they sound when you say them aloud? Where is God calling you to repent and turn to His ways?
